STATEMENT OF REASONS

Our decision

We have considered the objects of the *Liquor Act 2007* (the Act) and the relevant legislative provisions and have approved the application under section 45 of the Act.

Overall, we are satisfied that the social impact of approving the application will not be harmful to the well-being of the local or broader community.

The decision achieves the aim of the Act to regulate the liquor industry to meet the community's expectations, needs, and aspirations, while also promoting a balanced and responsible development of the industry.

Our main findings

The local community for the purposes of this decision is Murrumbateman. The broader community is the Local Government Area (LGA) of Yass Valley.

Positive social impacts

We are satisfied that the proposal would benefit the local and broader communities by providing increased convenience and choice.

The business owner proposes to operate a small liquor store in a newly constructed commercial development, located in the suburb of Murrumbateman, part of the Yass Valley Shire. Murrumbateman is in a renowned wine region that includes world-class wineries, vineyards, restaurants and farmers markets, attracting local and international visitors.

Liquor to be sold will comprise beer, local wines and cider, with tastings available and a strong focus on local high end liquor products not associated with bulk discounts. While the principal business will be that of a liquor store, a range of other complementary non-liquor items will be available for purchase.

Negative social impacts

We accept that the proposal could contribute to an increase in alcohol-related harm in the local and broader communities because of the:

- higher crime rates for alcohol-related domestic assault in both Murrumbateman and the Yass Valley compared to NSW
- higher rates of alcohol-attributable deaths in the Yass Valley compared to NSW, and
- higher saturation of packaged liquor licences in the Yass Valley compared to NSW.

However, we are satisfied that these risks are reduced by the:

- lower saturation rates of packaged liquor licences in Murrumbateman compared to NSW
- premises not being located in crime hotspots for any offence categories usually considered by the Authority
- lower crime rates in both the Murrumbateman and the Yass Valley for alcohol-related non-domestic assault, malicious damage and alcohol-related disorderly conduct
- lower rates of alcohol-attributable hospitalisations in the Yass Valley compared to NSW
- indication of above average level of socio-economic advantage in both Murrumbateman and the Yass Valley, and
- harm-minimisation measures outlined in the plan of management, and licence conditions as set out in Schedule 1.

The material we considered

We considered the following material when making our decision:

- the application material — including evidence that stakeholders and the community were notified about the application
- a community impact statement (CIS)

- the plan of the licensed premises and any authorisations
- a plan of management for the licensed business
- a development consent for the premises
- statistics from Liquor & Gaming NSW, Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research, NSW Health and Australian Bureau of Statistics on the socio-economic status, liquor licence density, alcohol-related crimes rates and health issues in the local and broader communities
- stakeholder submissions and the applicant's response them.

We also considered [Guideline 6](#) to assess the likely social impact to the local and broader community.

**Schedule 1 – Licence conditions to be imposed
Thyme to Taste**

No.	Condition to be imposed	Description
1.	6-hour closure	Section 11A of the <i>Liquor Act 2007</i> applies to this licence. Liquor must not be sold by retail on the licensed premises for a continuous period of six (6) hours between 01:00 AM and 07:00 AM during each consecutive period of 24 hours. The licensee must comply with this 6-hour closure period along with any other limits specified in the trading hours for this licence.
2.	Retail Sales	Good Friday Not permitted December 24th Normal trading Monday to Saturday 8:00 AM to 12:00 midnight Sunday Christmas Day Not permitted December 31st Normal trading Monday to Saturday 10:00 AM to 12:00 midnight Sunday
3.	Social impact	The business authorised by this licence must not operate with a greater overall level of social impact on the wellbeing of the local and broader community than what could reasonably be expected from the information contained in the Community Impact Statement, application and other information submitted in the process of obtaining this licence.
4.	Liquor Accord	The licensee or its representative must join and be an active participant in the local liquor accord.
5.	Plan of management	The premises is to be operated at all times in accordance with the Plan of Management dated 25 March 2023 as may be varied from time to time after consultation with NSW Police. A copy of the Plan of Management is to be kept on the premises and made available for inspection on the request of a police officer, council officer, Liquor and Gaming NSW inspector, or any other person authorised by the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority.
6.	CCTV	1) The licensee must maintain a closed-circuit television (CCTV) system on the licensed premises (“the premises”) in accordance with the following requirements: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) the system must record continuously from opening time until one hour after the premises is required to close, (b) recordings must be in digital format and at a minimum of ten (10) frames per second, (c) any recorded image must specify the time and date of the recorded image, (d) the system’s cameras must cover the following areas: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) all entry and exit points on the premises, and (ii) all publicly accessible areas (other than toilets) within the premises. 2) The licensee must also: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) keep all recordings made by the CCTV system for at least 30 days, (b) ensure that the CCTV system is accessible at all times the system is required to operate pursuant to clause 1(a), by at least one person able to access and fully operate the system, including downloading and producing recordings of CCTV footage, and (c) provide any recordings made by the system to a police officer or Liquor and Gaming NSW inspector within 24 hours of any request by the police officer or Liquor and Gaming NSW inspector to provide such recordings.

7.	Crime scene preservation	<p>Immediately after the person in charge of the licensed premises or a staff member becomes aware of any incident involving an act of violence causing injury to a person on the premises, the person in charge of the licensed premises and/or staff member must:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) take all practical steps to preserve and keep intact the area where the act of violence occurred, 2) retain all material and implements associated with the act of violence in accordance with the crime scene preservation guidelines issued by NSW Police, as published from time to time on the Liquor and Gaming NSW website, 3) make direct and personal contact with NSW Police to advise it of the incident, and 4) comply with any directions given by NSW Police to preserve or keep intact the area where the violence occurred. <p>In this condition, 'staff member' means any person employed by, or acting on behalf of, the licensee of the premises, and includes any person who is employed to carry on security activities (e.g. crowd controller or bouncer) on or about the premises.</p>
